District 6900 & FODAC Deliver Vital Medical Equipment to Texas Flood Survivors



When disaster strikes, Rotary shows up. In late July, **District 6900 Disaster Relief Chair Chris Brand**, who also serves as **President of FODAC (Friends of Disabled Adults and Children)**, led a critical mission to Texas to support communities recovering from devastating floods. In partnership with the American Red Cross and local response teams, Chris and his team delivered 250 pieces of durable medical equipment to aid survivors in urgent need. These included wheelchairs, walkers, shower chairs, and other essential items for individuals with mobility challenges.

“Getting this equipment into the hands of people who lost everything is why we do what we do,” said Brand during the handoff at a Red Cross facility. “We’re proud to partner with Rotary and national relief agencies to make recovery just a little easier for those hit hardest.”

The team on the ground, including Rotary and Red Cross volunteers, was all smiles during the delivery — a moment captured in the image of the memory wall — symbolizing a shared mission of hope and resilience.

The other photos show the impact zone where recovery continues, as well as a touching tribute wall filled with flowers and messages, honoring the lives affected and lost in the flood's aftermath.

District 6900’s continued commitment to disaster response ensures that when help is needed most, Rotary is there — prepared, equipped, and ready to serve.

While we're talking trees, Nassau Sunrise Rotarians and Rotaractors plant mangrove trees at Bonefish Pond National Park in Nassau as part of a project to restore the mangrove ecosystem and help protect the

coast against hurricanes.

Everyone has heard the adage, "You can't see the forest for the trees." It's easy for us to get so caught up in what we are doing and our own projects that we sometimes fail to see how our projects roll up into the big, no really the huge picture of The Rotary Foundation.

Even though we don't yet have the final numbers from last year, the numbers we do have are quite impressive and they are worth sharing with you now. Because of the hard work we all did last year, The Rotary Foundation contributed to funding more than \$88 million in global grants and more than \$28 million in district grants worldwide. It's a great example of how the Rotary Foundation transforms your gifts, changing lives both close to home and abroad. People from around the world are now able to live healthier lives, live in better communities, live in safer spaces and more beautiful places. What we have all accomplished together cannot be understated. Since the establishment of the Foundation more than 100 years ago, it has invested more than \$4 billion in changing lives and sustaining projects. All these point back to our mission: The Rotary Foundation helps Rotary members to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by providing quality education, improving the environment, and alleviating poverty.

District 6900 also had a banner year in 2024/25 and just as we are awaiting the worldwide numbers, we are still awaiting the district numbers, though we should see them very soon. What I can share is that both Foundation giving and Polio giving were up this year and that is always good news. We had 19 Global Grants submitted which was a record for the district. In addition, District 6900 contributed over \$69,000 to Zone 34 for Polio Plus. We awarded 59 Community Grants and 7 Competitive Grants. All of this adds up to a very successful year in 2024/25.

Now we look forward to 2025/26. I recently read one of the best quotes I've seen in a while and it's worth sharing here: "Together, we see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves." Certainly, the quote fits very nicely with this year's message, "Unite for good."

When we partner with The Rotary Foundation great things happen. Not only do we see it in the numbers, far more importantly, we see it in the faces of the people we serve and that's why we do it. Here's to a new year of Service Above Self! Let's continue to work together to make our Foundation stronger as it reaches greater heights.

GRSP Update

GRSP Approves Budget, Elects New Leadership & Honors Christopher at Summer Meeting

The Georgia Rotary Student Program and GRSP Foundation held its annual summer business meeting in mid-July in Macon. During the session, members approved the 2024 audit and upcoming fiscal budget, elected officers for 2025-2026, recognized new trustees and directors, and honored distinguished service and donor contributions.

The GRSP continues its 79-year mission of “World Peace Through Understanding” by awarding one-year ambassadorial scholarships to international college students sponsored by Rotary Clubs in Georgia.

Financial Integrity and Transparency: An independent audit by Fulton and Kozak confirmed a clean financial report for FY 2023-2024, with no material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. GRSP

maintains a favorable nonprofit efficiency ratio, dedicating 84 cents of every dollar to programmatic efforts.

2025-2026 Leadership Elections: Chair Emeritus and Parliamentarian Bert Guy presented the new slate of officers, unanimously approved by the Board of Trustees:

District 6920 District Governor Terry Adkins (Brunswick) was elected as Foundation President, with Mike Alexander (Hartwell) as Vice President, Teri White (Thomasville) as Treasurer, and Cheryl Huffman (Rome Seven-Hills) as Secretary.

District Governors, Steve Ivory for District 6900, Jessica Fleetwood for District 6910 and Adkins for District 6920 each reaffirmed their continued support for both GRSP and the GRSP Foundation.

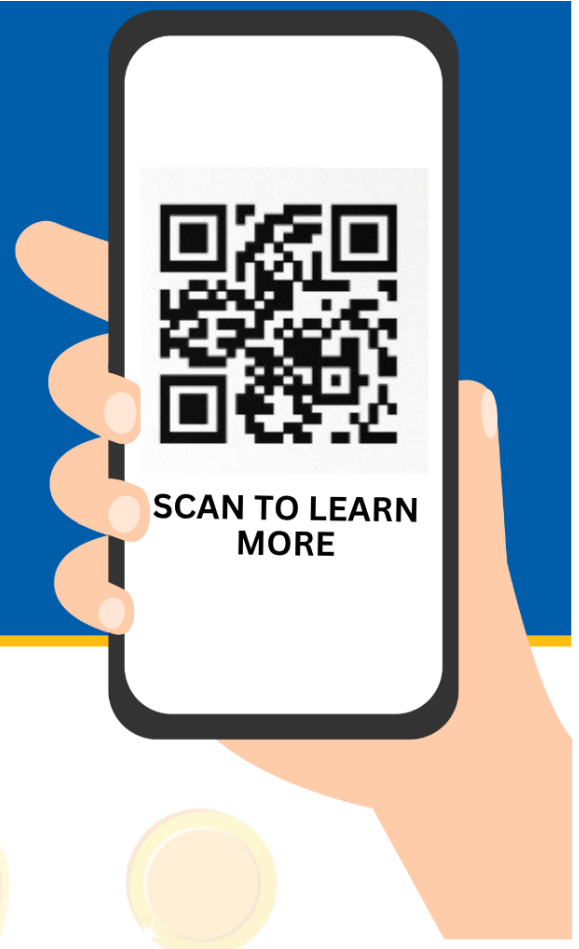

Our first RRC Hometown Hero honoree recognized decorated retired Army Medic Jarrad Turner, Sr. Turner, an Army medic who was deployed twice to Iraq and served a total of 10 years, is now Chief Executive Officer of Veterans Technology Solutions (VTS) USA and serves on the board of The Shepherd's Center in Atlanta. He has built a career defined by purpose, resilience, and results from the battlefield to the boardroom. He is committed to advancing the technology that addresses veterans' unique challenges including improving healthcare outcomes for those diagnosed with Traumatic Brain Injury.

As a member of the Shepherd's Men, he is one of many who are dedicated to raising the funds to support the Shepherd Center SHARE Military Initiative which has seen over 125 million people since the 2014 inception and raised over \$15million. In 2018, he and Scott Johnson founded the Warrior Alliance platform which serves 12,000 veterans across the South. Through his efforts, the Atlanta Braves donated a 5,000 square foot facility dedicated to veteran support in the Battery Atlanta. We are honored to recognize you, Retired Medic Jarrad Turner, Sr and all of your work to improve the lives of those who fought to protect our freedom.
