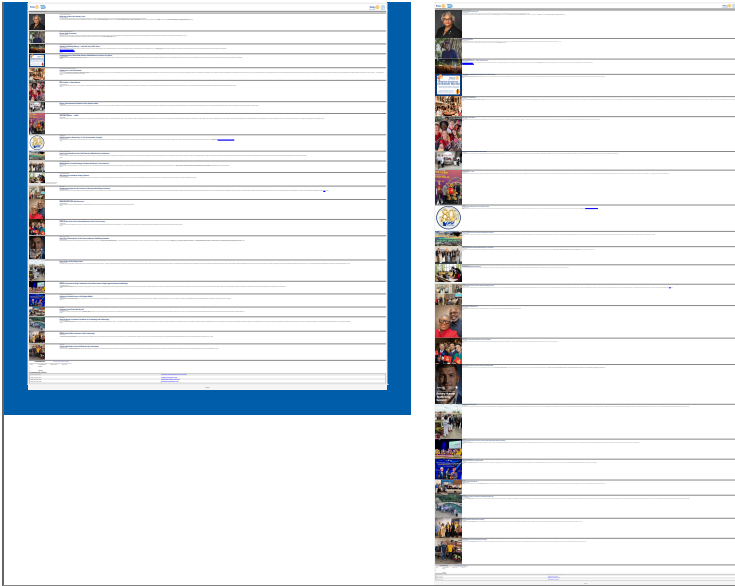

Together, we will continue serving our communities while working to eradicate polio, empower our youth, and strengthen our clubs through strategic, intentional, innovative thinking and bold leadership.

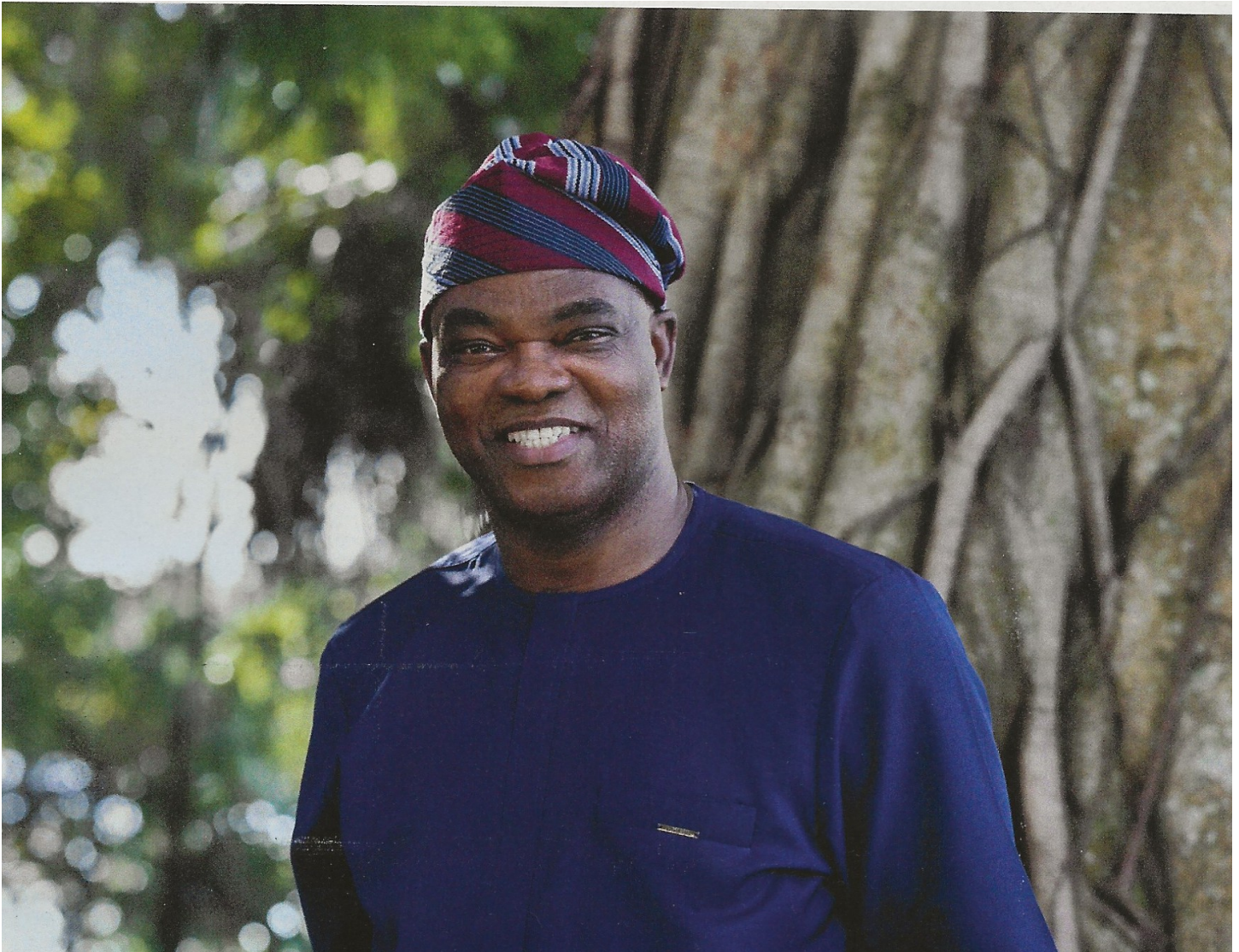
Let us accept President Yinka's challenge to make this our best Rotary year yet. I know we can.

Better Than Your Best



Rotary has a way of surprising you. It surprises you when a stranger across the table becomes a lifelong friend. It surprises you when a small project in one neighborhood ripples outward in ways you never imagined. And it may surprise you when you realize that the person Rotary has changed most ... is you.

That is why this year, we are called to harness the change within ourselves, to look to the future, and to ***Create Lasting Impact.***

Now, I want to be clear about what those words mean. Change is only the beginning. Impact is what endures. We must think of the long-term impact of every project. How can a new water system contribute to the long-term health of a community? Can residents help other communities build their own? How can a new classroom be part of a wider strategy to improve education in the area? That is the sort of thinking we need.

As we prioritize impact, we must also consider how our actions can contribute to peacebuilding. Peace does not happen by accident. It must be built deliberately and strategically. As you plan your next project, ask yourself: "How does this create the conditions for peace?" Nominations for our 2029-2030 District Governor are open. We need your help in identifying qualified candidates and officially nominating them by resolution of your club. The certified club resolution form will be sent to club presidents along with Article 16 of the Rotary Manual of Procedure that outlines the role and responsibilities of a District Governor. Any candidate clubs nominate must meet the following qualifications:

Qualifications of a Governor-nominee.

Unless excused by the board, the person selected as a governor-nominee shall at the time of selection:

- be a member in good standing of a functioning club in the district;
- have served as club president for a full term or as charter president for at least six months;
- demonstrate willingness, commitment, and ability to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of a governor in section 16.030.;

- demonstrate knowledge of the qualifications, duties, and responsibilities of governor as prescribed in the bylaws; and
- submit to RI a statement that the Rotarian understands those qualifications, duties, and responsibilities, is qualified for the office of governor, and is willing and able to assume and faithfully perform those duties and responsibilities.

Once nominated, send the club resolution along with a brief "Rotary Resume" for the candidate by **Saturday, October 31, 2026** to Mandy Timmons, District 6900 Executive Manager at d6900executivesecretary@gmail.com. Our district nominating committee which is chaired by our District Governor and consists of our Governor line along with our Past District Governors will **interview candidates on Saturday, November 14, 2026**. RYLA

RYLA 2026 - A Rave Review



RYLA brings together young people from different backgrounds - home, educational, religious, and lifestyle - for the opportunity to challenge themselves through small team activities, large group activities, and candid, round-table discussions. RYLA programming includes individual personality profiles, conflict resolution styles, and ropes course activities in a schedule designed to encourage each student's growth in the areas of teamwork, communication, and trust. RYLA aims to build new leaders for your schools, communities, and clubs.

Included once again was the opportunity to participate in a service project which allows the students to experience the Rotary motto of "Service Above Self" firsthand as RYLA partnered with Rise Against Hunger to package 17,280 meals that will be sent overseas to less fortunate countries with inadequate food supplies. New in the RYLA lineup is a scavenger hunt of activities designed around Rotary's seven Areas of Focus, teaching the students more about what Rotary can do for the world around them.

One of the recurring themes of RYLA is the student who accomplishes a feat he/she would have never dared to imagine before coming to camp. The most memorable of these culminating events are always the board break, which allows students to break through their fears to reach their goals, and the Trust Fall from a 5-foot platform into the waiting arms of teammates. And just as always, most of the students who were very hesitant to spend 5 days with over 100 strangers became the friends who did not want to part ways at the end. This speaks volumes to the benefit of RYLA and the positive changes it can create in young lives.

Even more telling of the long-lasting influence of RYLA is the fact that 90% of the counselors were once RYLA participants themselves - they believe in it enough to commit the time and energy to return each year and make RYLA the best experience possible. Over 25 Rotary members - coming from Americus, Peachtree City, Fayetteville, Moultrie, and Roswell - volunteered directly with RYLA as staff, chaperones, talent show judges, or to meet the buses in Atlanta and Columbus. We also had at least 2 Rotary spouses and 9 community members volunteering in some capacity to make RYLA possible, not to mention all those working at the club level to secure the nomination and selection of student participants. And once again, this year we had the honor of welcoming many district leaders, among them DG Steve Ivory, DGE Cynthia Edwards, and DGND Amy Benton. PDG Gordon Owens even volunteered again for the whole week as a counselor - that makes 3 years for him (and counting)!

If you want to change the life of a young student, send them to RYLA. They will discover their potential and develop the skills needed to be leaders in their communities, careers, and everyday lives. And they achieve these goals while having fun, building friendships, and creating memories that will last a lifetime.

If, by chance, you studied the ancient language of Latin or perhaps Roman history somewhere in your past, the phrase, "The ides of March" will be familiar to you. In 44 BCE (Before the Common Era) Julius Caesar was assassinated on March 15 and the term, "Beware of the Ides of March" was born, signifying a potentially bad omen. However, the 15th of any given month can also simply signify the middle of the month and provide us with a chance to look back over the first half of the month and then look forward to what is yet to come. The Ides of June 2026 provides we as Rotarians with a very special moment to do just that. This year, the Ides of June signified the end of our International Convention in Taipei, Taiwan. The convention was full of presentations delivered by the very top of our organization that looked back over our Rotary year with all its accomplishments, while they also focused on the goals of the next Rotary year and where we are going.

I had the opportunity to attend this year's Rotary Convention in Taipei, having just returned. It was my first visit to this stunningly beautiful country. An experience I will never forget and one that will be hard to match in the future. Imagine spending a week with more than 37,000 of your closest Rotary friends. The picture with this article is one of my favorite photos from the convention as I share this photo with my dear friend, outgoing District 6900 District Governor Steve Ivory, a facsimile of the World Polio Chair Mike McGovern and of course the "End Polio Now" Bear. I have so many photos from the adventure I wish I could share with you all, however what I want to focus on in this month's opening year article is a speech that was delivered by our Rotary Foundation Chair Holger Knaack at "Rotary26."

Chairman Knaack began by reminding us that when Arch Klumph created the Foundation in 1917, he did so for mainly one rudimentary and fundamental reason. He understood that Rotary Clubs could accomplish so much more working in concert together than they could ever accomplish by themselves. As he stated, "that idea is still the engine of everything our Foundation does." The point of his speech that day was to share with us why he believes that idea matters even more today! He made the point that the Rotary Foundation, "does not exist in some tower in Evanston." But rather, it exists within our districts, our clubs and in the very hands and if I may personally add, in the very heart of every Rotarian. He wanted us to be sure to know that the decisions of where our Foundation dollars are ultimately invested lay with us and us alone. The decisions are made by the districts, the clubs and donors themselves and not some bureaucrats in an ivory tower. Those dollars are funneled through district grants and global grants and land in every one of our areas of focus. He went on to point out that where the professional staff of the Foundation come not play is to ensure the grants are tracked and managed properly, that they are executed efficiently and that they have the greatest impact they can have, but it is YOU the Rotarian foot soldiers who bring all the ideas to the table, manage the relationships and see to it that every dollar is put to the best use possible to raise up the people we service.

Chairman Knaack reminded us that when we think of our Grants for the coming year, we need to keep in mind all the areas of work our grants cover, including maternal and child healthcare, education, prevention of disease, advancement of clean water and sanitation initiative, the betterment of economic development help for protecting the environment. He went on to say that all of these grants are shaped by Rotarians who know their communities better than anyone else and thus will ensure the greatest impact. It was exhilarating to hear him speak. It made me sit up and truly be proud to be a Rotarian and to think about how I get to play such an important role with each of you as we together bring these grants across the finish line. How humbled I am to play any role in it.

To add to all of this, how satisfying it is to know that we not only do all these things but that others notice it as well. Did you know that for 17 consecutive years our "world class" charitable foundation carries a four-star rating from Charity Navigator.

We now sit at the beginning of a new Rotary year. This year is my last year of the three-year appointment

as District 6900's Foundation Chair. Let's make this year the best Rotary year every for those we serve in the good name of The Rotary Foundation!

Conclave is where it all begins for GRSP. This year, 38 international college scholarship students from 20 countries around the world will gather to meet each other for the first time, connect with their host families, and engage with Georgia Rotarians. These incredible students will be representing GRSP at 23 colleges and universities across the state.

Founded in 1946 in the aftermath of World War II to foster peace through understanding, GRSP has

brought approximately 4,000 students from 113 countries to Georgia. As Jim Drake, 2026 Conclave Chair and GRSP Chair Emeritus, shares:

"Celebrating GRSP's 80th anniversary is a powerful reminder this program is about more than just classroom education. It's about coming to realize that although we are from different countries, have different languages and cultures, in the end, our similarities far outweigh our differences."

Why Rotary Foundation Giving Matters

Look at these faces. Children and a teacher, at a desk absorbed in a laptop, a big a small thing. It is the beginning of everything we say we care about.

Education is the one of the quietest and most powerful tool the Foundation funds. A child who can read can question. A child who can question is harder to deceive, harder to recruit into hatred, harder to frighten into cruelty. Most hate is not born in the heart — it is taught to a mind that was never given anything better to hold. Education fills that space first, and crowds the hatred out.

From learning comes health. A girl who finishes school marries later, raises healthier children, and breaks a cycle of poverty that no single grant could touch. From learning comes peace, because people who understand one another have less to fear and less to fight over. From learning comes respect — the kind we earn through service, not the kind we demand.

This is why The Rotary Foundation matters. Through our Annual Fund, Polio Plus and their matching programs, a gift does not merely add — it multiplies. Dollars become classrooms. Classrooms become futures. Futures become a world with less ignorance and more dignity.

And there is a reward the giver keeps: the deep satisfaction of knowing your resources became someone's possibility. We do not give because it is easy to ask. We give because the result is permanent.

Look again at these faces. They will not remember our names. They will live the difference we chose to make.

This Rotary year has extraordinary. **Under DG Steve Ivory and PDG Bob Hagan, we collectively donated \$1,134,737 in the 2025-26 Rotary year.** We've answered the prayers of parents worldwide. We've increased goodwill and better friendships everywhere.

End Polio Now

Polio at the Start of the Second Quarter of the 21st Century!

Let the title of this month's Polio article sit with you for a moment. Can you believe that we have already traveled one quarter of the way through the 21st century? It seems like just yesterday the world was petrified about the potential effects of Y2K and now we have already moved 25 years past it.

If you have already read my Foundation article for July 2026, then you are aware I just returned from Taipei and the "#Rotary26" convention. What a time it was! Attending a convention with over 37,000 Rotarians was quite an adventure. Without a doubt, one of the highest attended breakout sessions, as you might imagine, was the session focused on where we are in the fight to eradicate Polio worldwide. The session was entitled, "Join the Experts: A Polio Free World".

Although there wasn't a tremendous amount of new News on the fight, that doesn't mean there wasn't any news or that there wasn't any good news. When the top leaders of the 40-year march to eradicate Polio speak, to listen is good idea. Michael K. McGovern, the chair of the International PolioPlus Committee, had much to comment on. He stated that even though we have sustained some years of disappointment in the quest and we face, as he stated, "international factors", still there is good reason for optimism. Even to the point of stating that this year could be the year we see the last case of the wild polio virus in Pakistan. Certainly, there has been political unrest and different wars to deal with still there is good news in the fact that vaccine refusal rates are at the lowest levels ever.

Johrita Solari, who is the chair of the Polio Eradication Advocacy Task force here in the United States echoed the fact that the eradication story is, as he put it, "the rare, good news story" in a world that seems always filled with nothing but bad news. He went on to point out that, "Polio eradication is an inspiring example of the power of collective action, enduring commitment, and effective partnerships, with proven results".

Chairman McGovern went on to point out that for five straight years, the United States has appropriated \$265 million dollars to the Polio eradication effort. Valarie Wafer, who is a member of the international PolioPlus Committee, also spoke in the breakout session and her main point was to express strong support for polio survivors to continue to tell their personal stories and that in the countries of Pakistan and Afghanistan polio survivors are actually going door to door with vaccination front line workers to get the children vaccinated! Now that is commitment.

Other panelists spoke about the necessity of employing as much technology to the effort as possible, particularly around education. Gaining the trust of those in the outlying areas of Pakistan has been perhaps the biggest obstacle in the vaccination effort. Therefore, the approach of bringing nutrition experts along with maternal care professionals has helped make greater inroads in the eradication efforts.

We now sit at the beginning of a new Rotary year. This year is my last year of the three-year appointment as District 6900's Foundation Chair. How wonderful if by the end of this year we could say, eradication has been achieved. Certainly that is my goal and I know it's your goal as well. So, let's make this year the best Rotary year ever for those we serve in the good name of PolioPlus and the Rotary Foundation! Always remember that we together can end Polio. We are this close. We must continue to spread the word and keep awareness of this terrible disease at the forefront of our thoughts and work. Keep the contributions coming as every dollar counts and is matched 2 for 1 by the Gates Foundation. This is OUR legacy as Rotarians!

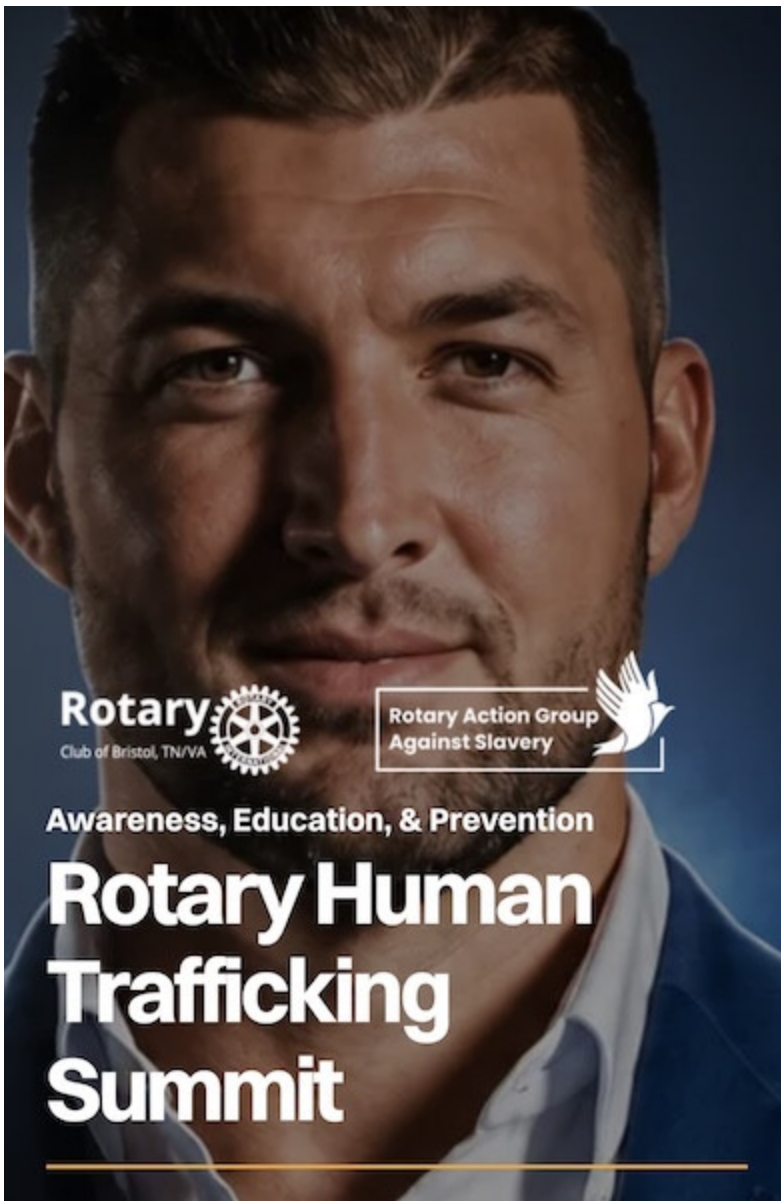

Peace Pole At The King Center



On Saturday, June 20, Rotary District 6900 made history in one of the most meaningful locations in America — planting a permanent Peace Pole at the entrance to the Peace & Meditation Garden at The King Center in Atlanta, just steps from the tomb of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and the Eternal Flame that bears his legacy.

The dedication ceremony was led by Rotary International President Francesco Arezzo, who joined district members, representatives from the City of Atlanta, and The King Center for the unveiling. The gathering was a testament to what Rotary looks like when it operates at its best — local commitment backed by global leadership, united around a single, powerful message.

At the base of the pole, a bronze plaque carries the words of Dr. King himself: “Peace is not merely a distant goal that we seek, but a means by which we arrive at that goal.” In that spirit, the pole’s message — May Peace Prevail On Earth — is inscribed in four languages chosen by the City of Atlanta: English, French, Spanish, and Arabic, welcoming a world that gathered in Atlanta this summer for the FIFA World Cup.

This installation was the capstone of a district-wide effort launched during the 2024-25 Rotary year. Inspired by a challenge from then-Rotary International President Stephanie Urchick, District 6900 planted more than 50 peace poles across metro Atlanta and the southwestern half of Georgia over the past year — in parks, at schools, and in front of libraries. This one, an eight-foot granite post at one of the most visited civil rights landmarks in the world, stands as the most significant of them all.

The pole will endure long after the ceremony. Every visitor who walks through the Peace & Meditation Garden — whether they come from Atlanta or the other side of the world — will pass a message placed there by the men and women of Rotary District 6900. That is the lasting impact of service done well: not just what it accomplishes today, but what it says about who we are for generations to come.

District Investment Helps Transform Law Enforcement's Fight Against Human Trafficking



The **Rotary Club of Columbus** welcomed an important and timely program last week focused on the ongoing fight against human trafficking and the role specialized law enforcement training plays in protecting vulnerable individuals.

Bobbi Star - Rotarian, Co-Founder, and Executive Director of Micah's Promise - introduced the program, while Jason Dennis facilitated a distinguished panel featuring Joseph Austin of the Columbus Police Department, Captain Johnny Middlebrooks of the Talbot County Sheriff's Office, and Mike O'Keefe of the Muscogee County Sheriff's Office. Together, the panel discussed the topic, "End Human Trafficking: A Law Enforcement Report."

Over the last two years, Rotary District 6900 has made a significant investment in combating human trafficking through specialized training for area law enforcement officers. Through the District's End Human Trafficking Committee, \$15,000 was provided to bring nationally recognized trainer Dan Nash to Columbus. The Rotary Club of Columbus partnered in the effort by providing the venue and hospitality for the training event.

Each officer shared how the training challenged long-held misconceptions and transformed the way they investigate cases, prosecute offenders, and interact with victims. They spoke about learning new communication techniques that help victims open up and emphasized the importance of strengthening partnerships between law enforcement and the community.

“The training made us look at victimology completely differently,” the officers shared, explaining how understanding trauma has changed their approach to investigations and survivors.

Bobbi Starr noted that a significant shift is occurring in the fight against trafficking, with greater focus being placed on pursuing the buyers who drive the industry. She also emphasized that many of the girls served through Micah’s Promise are commercially sexually exploited children and that without intervention, many victims of childhood exploitation become adults trapped in prostitution.

The panel expressed gratitude for Rotary’s investment in law enforcement education and highlighted the importance of collaboration between community organizations and law enforcement to protect the most vulnerable.

President Alan Harkness also recognized Past President Meredith for her leadership in securing the grant that funded the Dan Nash training, helping make this transformative program possible.

Update on Global Grant to End Spina Bifida



When you dig a well or build a habitat, progress is obvious. But public health projects usually take time – often measured in years – to see results and benefits. The **Rotary Club of North Atlanta (RCNA)** and their partners are in the third year of a planned five-year global grant project to reduce severe birth defects in Ethiopia, supported by District 6900 and The Rotary Foundation. Collaborators include Emory University, two other U.S. Rotary clubs, the Rotary Club of Addis Ababa Central Mella and the ReachAnother Foundation.

Ethiopia has one of the highest worldwide rates of neural tube defects or NTDs (including spina bifida and anencephaly). The Rotary project provides supplemental vitamin B9 (*folic acid*) to Ethiopian women at who are at a 10-fold higher risk because of a prior NTD pregnancy. The B9 supplement helps to prevent NTDs, but it must be taken before and during pregnancy to be effective.

Eligible mothers have been recruited for the program at six public hospitals in Addis Ababa since November 2023. Candidates must be of reproductive age with an NTD history.

Each participant receives daily *ReachAnother Foundation Folic Acid Supplementation Program | 2026 Mid-Year Report* confirms birth defect prevention and positive pregnancy outcomes. Among the findings for the 113 mothers who have given birth out of the 2783 mothers currently enrolled in the program:

- 111 mothers (98.2%) have had a normal birth

- One child died at birth
- One newborn had an NTD.

In Ethiopia, about 7 out of 100 mothers who have had one child with an NTD are predicted to have another affected child: 1 out of 113 is a major reduction.

These results must be interpreted with due caution because it is not a scientific study, and more robust data is forthcoming. Nonetheless, the program's nascent results are encouraging, and it could become a template for similar efforts in other countries with high NTD rates.

Meanwhile, Ethiopia is making major strides toward a sustainable solution by fortifying wheat and salt with vitamin B9, for an even greater national impact on the reducing the burden of this often-devastating birth defect. A pharmaceutical company in Ethiopia is now making the high dose vitamin B9 tablets.

R.I. President Francesco Arezzo and his wife visited the award-winning project in Ethiopia and recognized the work of Rotarian Dr. Yakob Ahmed and others. While in Ethiopia, President Arezzo met with the President of Ethiopia and the Minister of Health.
