Minutes from the July 17 Meeting

New Marietta Rotary members, **Chris Mitchell** and **Julie O'Meara**, were inducted and bestowed a new membership package and temporary red badge by **Kelly Maxwell** and

Tyler Stephens. Please introduce yourself and welcome them if you have not done so already. Chris Mitchell, who also owns a flag company, presented the club a golden eagle finial to be placed on top of the American flag.

Daniel White then provided the invocation and announced visitors and guests. Visiting Rotarian Jennifer Barker was in attendance as a guest of Chris Bethel. Mary Evelyn White, daughter of Dan White, attended her first Rotary meeting with her Dad.

Sunshine was facilitated by **Walt Walker**. Chris Bethel was first in honoring new Rotary members. **Bill Dunaway** recognized the presence of Past President (and daughter) **Dawn McEachern**. All Sunshine monies are donated to the Polio Fund.

Fred Beloin introduced the speaker. Sam Newton graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 1968 with a Bachelor of Science Degree and then from the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School in 1969 with a Master's degree in Management. He resides in Lee's Crossing and is a neighbor of Fred Beloin. In 1985 Sam moved to Marietta to join the Institute of Nuclear Power Operations, a non-profit organization formed by the nation's nuclear utilities as the industry's response to the Three Mile Island accident. Since retiring he has done some consulting work in the nuclear industry. Sam and his wife, Sandy, have four children, two of whom are Naval Academy graduates, and two of whom are University of Georgia graduates. They have seven grandchildren and one of them is attending the U.S. Air Force Academy. Sam will discuss the Three Mile Island incident.

It has been 40 years since a meltdown of Three Mile Island became the most significant nuclear accident in U.S. history. On March 28, 1979, one of the reactors at that power plant partially melted down, releasing radiation and revealing flaws within both the system and in how authorities respond to emergencies.

Where Is Three Mile Island?

Three Mile Island is a strip of land in the Susquehanna River, a little south of Pennsylvania's capital Harrisburg. It is a little more than 2 miles long and is 3 miles downstream from Harrisburg International Airport.

What happened in 1979?

The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission reports that a mechanical or electrical failure caused an issue with the reactor core's cooling system leading to an automatic shutdown. A relief valve then opened to relieve the rising pressure in the nuclear area of the plant but got stuck in the open position, despite a readout indicating to plant workers that it had closed once the pressure was stabilized. As a result the plant staff was unaware that cooling water was pouring out of the stuck-open valve.

Without proper cooling, the nuclear fuel got too hot, and a significant portion of the core melted. According to the commission, the building contained much of the radioactive material preventing a larger disaster. Remediation efforts lasted for more than a decade after the incident and changed the way nuclear plant processes were managed, and the methods of communication for reporting disasters.

Nobody died or was injured in the initial incident at Three Mile Island. However, the meltdown released radiation, which scientific studies have linked to cancer cases that cropped up in the years following the accident.

Is Three Mile Island Closing?

In September of 2019 Exelon will close the facility due to economic reasons. Unit 1 was not involved in the 1979 accident. This TMI-2 accident is one of the reasons for the decline of new reactor construction. The 1979 accident did not initiate the demise of the U.S. nuclear power industry but did halt its historic growth. Federal requirements to correct safety issues and design deficiencies became more stringent. Construction times were significantly lengthened and costs skyrocketed. Three Mile Island Unit 2 was too badly damaged and contaminated to resume operations, the reactor was gradually deactivated and Unit 2 permanently closed. It had been online only 13 months. Cleanup started in August 1979 and ended in December 1993 with a total estimated cleanup cost of \$1 billion with an estimated property damage of \$2.4 billion. In 2017 it was announced that operations would cease by 2019 due to financial pressure from cheap natural gas, unless law makers stepped in to keep it open. When it became clear the subsidy legislation would not pass, Exelon decided to retire the plant by September 30, 2019.

Lessons Learned

The Three Mile Island accident occurred from an unanticipated interaction of multiple failures in a complex system. Such modern, high-risk systems were prone to failures however well they are managed. The advice was to better contemplate a radical redesign or to abandon such technology entirely.

Several authors blamed operator error, inadequate training, lack of skill, but whatever the cause some operators contributed to the incident and accident. President Carter ordered a study which reached the same conclusions. The major factor was inappropriate actions caused by insufficient training, poor design, and federal commissions regulating nuclear power. There were weaknesses in planning on everyone's part. Utility and NRC did not coordinate press releases. Everyone was saying different things. Radiation numbers were reported incorrectly. Thus, an evacuation was advised, and women and children within a 5 mile radius were evacuated. All resulted in a loss of confidence in nuclear power in the U.S. The NRS instituted changes and developed operational and info sharing processes. An assistance program resides in Cobb County.

Sam's closing statement was that the general population was scared to death and one of his neighbors commented

that's your job, but I hope they never have a nuclear plant. Interestingly the people residing around the plant did not benefit from the plant itself.

The speaker then closed and requested questions from the audience.

Sam Newton graduated from the Naval Academy with a very famous American, Oliver North. Ex-Marine Dan Kirk then posed the question was Oliver North's behavior as outrageous as reputed. Dan proceeded to tell a story of being in a dining room with a bunch of other marines having lunch, whereupon Oliver North enters, jumps on a table, and begins firing an M16 in the room full of marines. Oliver's message was be prepared for the unexpected. Dan questioned the wisdom of this action. Sam responded that stories of Oliver's escapades were legend; however, since Dan was present at this one, it was not another urban legend.

The Opportunity Drawing was managed by sportily attired **Jim Trapnell** and **Holly Walquist**. This week the green bag contained 14 marbles including the red.
