




Leadership Today and Tomorrow

One of the more visible changes the Covid 19 pandemic has produced in our society is a negative mindset toward work among our newest generation of workers. Past generations tended to look to the workplace not only for stable income, but also as a source of opportunity through which they could compete and learn while advancing their careers and income. Conversely, new workers, now entering the workforce, tend to view work as a burden or necessary evil. Whereas many workers in previous generations enjoyed pride in their work, as well as financial security from eventual retirement benefits, many newer workers have a much different way of thinking about work.



Significant numbers of new generation workers are products of a failing education system, manipulative social engineering, and inflated promises concerning augmented intelligence. One thing, however, that never changes is human nature. Once young workers enter the workforce, what they experience when dealing with their supervisors has a profound impact on their attitudes about work, morale, loyalty, and long-term expectations.

Those who find themselves working under the supervision of someone who fits the stereotype of a "boss," they are likely to tune-out and disengage early in their work life. They are quickly put off by traditional bosses who fail to relate to workers in ways likely to motivate them to achieve job satisfaction. "Bosses" tend to discourage young employees and make them want to frequently switch jobs, work from home, maximize their use of the Family Leave Act, or value time off more than an opportunity to build a career. Many bosses seem to make young people become more excited about watching others play video games than building a future and a family.

A stereotypical "boss" is generally self-absorbed, self-promoting, insecure, paranoid and more work-centered than people-centered. They rarely see themselves as others see them, and they tend to lack vision of a better tomorrow. They think of their employees or volunteers mainly as inferior subordinates. Relying primarily on the power and authority of their position rather than their personality, expertise, or ability, many bosses also have no problem taking credit for someone else's ideas or accomplishments. Bosses tend to stifle individual growth and productivity rather than promote it.

The characteristics of a leader are much different than those of a "boss." Leaders, at any level, are more employee-centered and they understand the long-term success of their team depends on individual employee job satisfaction, morale, personal growth and maturity. Leaders also cultivate their inner vision, and develop interpersonal job skills like perceptiveness, oral and written communication skills, conflict resolution, and both decision-making and decisiveness. These are traits that appeal to the human nature of young employees.

Leaders understand that rather than following orders or mandates, employees respond best to leader behaviors that teach employees and, to the greatest extent possible, treat them with sympathetic understanding of personal problems and situations. Leaders are

also more likely to encourage workers by providing positive reinforcement for good work and help them feel "in on things" by keeping them in the loop.

Good leadership tends to get better as a leader evolves. Ultimately, the good leader can become a "servant leader;" accomplishing personal and organizational goals by serving the needs of their followers and associates. Servant leadership is satisfying because it is rooted in faith. In fact, the bible is replete with lessons in servant leadership and Jesus was the ultimate servant leader.

True leaders are tough in a quiet way. They are not generally nervous, impatient, vengeful, biased or mean-spirited, but they do not bend on matters of truth, values or integrity. They know that not everyone will always like or agree with them, but they can handle it. Their real audience is not the people in their workplace; it is their faith or higher power.

Leadership is demanding on both the time and emotional energy of the leader insofar as leadership is only accomplished through direct human interaction where the full range of verbal and non-verbal messages are exchanged. More to the point, leadership is not effective if it is applied over the telephone, through email or internet osmosis; it must be in person on a regular basis. Nonetheless, leadership has its own rewards when the leader realizes they have elevated and made true positive differences in the lives of others.

At the end of the day, the newest generation of workers are not much different than previous generations, although they may feel they are more enlightened than those who came before them. On some level, they may be, but many have also been raised by a failing manipulative mostly secular educational system. Thus, they often lack wisdom and productive life skills. For them to reach fulfilling productive and rewarding work lives in the future, they will need to seek and follow leaders, not bosses. Hopefully, there will be enough leaders to go around.
